World Book Day Thursday 2nd March 2023

Trewirgie Infants' School will be celebrating reading and the world of books in lots of different ways on this day.

As a school we are inviting the children to dress up if they want to. The children can wear a World Book Day costume based on a story character they like, wear pyjamas to enjoy some all-day bedtime stories or create their own costume. Dressing up for World Book Day is optional so if your child does not want to dress up please don't worry.

Each year group will have its own exciting plans for the day so keep an eye out for Class Dojo messages from your child's class teacher regarding plans for the day.

After school, from 3:30pm - 4:15pm on World Book Day Miss Maun will be running a 'Magpie Nest trail' for parents and children to take part in. Families can hunt for words that will be hidden around the school and add them to the magpie nest in the main hall.

In the main hall there will also be a cake stall (cakes or buns to be donated please) as well as a 'book swap and shop' stall.

The book swap and shop stall will have lots of second-hand books you may like to buy. Your child can also bring some books from home (that they no longer want to read) and swap them for books from the stall. There is no cost to swap a book, just an opportunity to take some new books home to read.

The cake stall and book shop will be run by the PTA and will help us to raise funds to allow us to update our class libraries so please support us if you can.

Attendance:

The world is run by people who turn up!

Attending school on a regular basis is the key to your child doing well at school and will set them up with good routines for later life and the working world, as well as giving your child the opportunity to:

- make lots of friends and feel included
- learn new things and develop many skills
- increase confidence and self esteem
- improve social skills
- achieve potential and fulfil aspirations.

At Trewirgie Infants' School we aim for 96% attendance.

If a child who attends school for 90% of the time they will be absent from school for the equivalent of one-half day a week. Over a whole school they would miss four weeks of lessons and would also spend more time away from school over the year than in school!

If their attendance for his whole time at school was 90% he would have missed 209 days of school, that's a whole school year!

· When your child is absent

Only the Headteacher can officially authorise an absence, but unless there is a concern, the staff will usually do this on their behalf. Parents should provide reasons for absences and the school must decide whether or not they justify authorisation according to Government guidelines.

Authorised absences

- Genuine illness of the pupil
- o Hospital or dental appointment for the pupil
- Death of a near relative
- Religious observance (faith of the parents or carers)

Unauthorised absences

- o A shopping trip
- o A birthday treat
- o Oversleeping due to a late night
- o Looking after other children
- Letting the gas man in, etc.
- The parent or carer is unwell

Whenever a child is absent from school the parent should

- Contact the school as soon as possible on the first day of absence. If no notification of absence is received, the school office will contact the parents to ascertain the reason.
- Where possible let the school know in advance of any planned absences, for example hospital appointments.
- o Where possible make medical or dental appointments out of school hours.

Term time leave

Family holidays should take place during the school holiday dates. These are published a year in advance. Please be mindful that absence due to a leave during term time is not, and never has been a parent's entitlement.

If leave during term time cannot be avoided, a leave request form should be completed. These can be obtained from the school office. The Headteacher will then decide whether or not to authorise this absence. Headteachers can only authorise leave during term time if "exceptional circumstances" exist, even if your child has an excellent attendance record or if you believe that the reason for the absence is justified.


Arriving late to school

When a child arrives late to school it can be very disruptive to your child, the teacher and other children in the class. If your child arrives late to school they will be marked as late on the register. If your child arrives very late, the child will be marked as an "Unauthorised Late" - This is the same as an Unauthorised Absence.

Absence and the law

As a parent you are committing an offence if you fail to make sure that your child attends regularly.

The school monitors attendance monthly and has identified those children who are within the Persistent Absence category - this is when attendance is below 90% for a period of time. Attendance letters will be sent to these parents to alert them to their child's absence in line with our Attendance policy.



This week in the nursery we had a visit from a dentist and we have been learning all about looking after our teeth. The children also enjoyed mixing our pancake mixture and practising pancake tossing skills with our play dough.



The children in reception had a very exciting week back after half term. They walked to visit Wheal Uny mine and whilst they were there they found some very mysterious objects. They found a Cornish flag and a note from The Cornish Knockers, some very cheeky creatures! The children also found a box in their classroom. It was a treat from The Cornish Knockers! They were given scones, jam and cream in return for some facts about Cornwall. After thinking carefully about what we could tell them we prepared our scones and ate them at snack time. They were delicious. All week we have been writing notes for the Knockers and they have been writing notes for us. We have also learnt about King Edward and Robinson mine that we have named Class 1 and Class 3 after. We learnt about the tools miners used and the machines that were used to help the miners to extract the tin from the rock. We acted out the different processes involved in mining the tin.



In Year 1 we have had such a busy week. In History, we have been learning about how Redruth became a town. We found out the King allowed markets in the 1300s and then how many people moved here because of mining. We are reading the book 'The Man Engine Remembers' - The children would love to hear your stories if you saw it in Redruth in 2016. We also enjoyed a brilliant music / history workshop with Will Keating. In English we have been learning the poem - On the Ning Nang Nong. The children have loved this poem and have been challenged to learn it off by heart and say it without giggling!



This week in year 2 had a special visitor! Will Keating (who is an incredible Cornish Folk Singer and performs with the Cornish based group 'The Oggymen') came into our school to run a workshop which linked to our current topics in history, music and our Cornish speaking! The children had a fantastic time and all joined in with the singing and dancing. They sang along with traditional Cornish songs and Will spoke to them about the mining history in Redruth. We joined together at the end of the day to sing as one big group and it was a magnificent sight to see all of the children joining in and enjoying the music.



This week in our Klub Kernewek (Cornish Club) we have been playing a memory game and learning the Cornish words and some stories along the way. We loved learning about Cornish king crabs and how they used to be called spider crabs. The Cornish word for crab is 'kanker'.
